

ACTION TAKEN REPORT 2017-18

In view of the feedback analysis, the gaps in the syllabus as per the requirement of various stakeholders, the department has taken the feedback on curriculum from the students, faculties, alumni, industry experts and parents. Suggestions to revise the syllabus with the inclusion of components of: Internationalization of curriculum; Service learning; and Interdisciplinary approaches were consolidated and discussed in IQAC and CDC, then communicated to the subject teachers. It was decided in the meetings that this feedback report be communicated to University.

The above changes were put forth in the Board of Studies meeting in January 2018, and 18.33% of curriculum revision was brought about in both BALLB and BBALLB courses which included components of service learning, interdisciplinary approach and international relevance.

As suggested by the IQAC, CDC and BOS following actions were prominently taken:

- 1. To help students to cater to a global market and to enhance research-based learning, curriculums were revised
- 2. Five new electives on *History of Law and Justice, Legal Statistics, Law of Injunction, Criminology, Penology and Victimology* and *Real Estate and Infrastructure Development Laws.*
- 3. More contemporary legal topics were introduced in the curriculum.
- 4. Lectures by industry experts and workshops on different fields of law to inculcate interests in subjects were organized.
- 5. Students are given an orientation in the first year to help them understand the various opportunities in law school.
- 6. Slow learners and advanced learners are given more attention according to their needs.
- 7. Mentoring sessions to help students after classes were held.
- 8. Skill oriented components have been included in the courses during revision.
- 9. To enhance their life skills departmental fests are held.
- 10. Faculty development programs to equip faculty members with new areas of law have been undertaken.



Meeting

The BOS Meeting started at 3.30 pm in Room No. 505, Central Block of Christ University. Dr. Sandeep S. Desai, welcomed the external experts, invitees, *ex officio* members and faculty members to the meeting and outlined the agenda for the same. Discussions were initiated on the matters listed in the agenda.

Dr. Fincy Pallissery introduced the B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) and B.B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) syllabus for the year 2017-18 with revised course structure. The same were discussed and unanimously adopted.

"It is hereby resolved that the syllabus for B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) and B.B.A., LL.B. (Hons.), with revised course structure, for the year 2017-18 be adopted."

Dr. Fincy Pallissery introduced the Five New Elective Subjects further for B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) and B.B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) along with syllabus for the year 2017-18. Following were the new electives introduced: Criminology, Penology and Victimology, History of Law and Justice, Law of Injunction, Legal Statistics, Real Estate and Infrastructure Development Laws.

The same were discussed and unanimously adopted.

Following changes were proposed to the syllabus of existing elective subjects:

- Law, Poverty and Development A new unit was included containing following details: Development, Right to development, United Nations Charter, Right to development as a Group Right, The Rio Declaration, 1992, The Principles of Rio Declaration, Copenhagen Declaration, 1995, Significance of Declarations on the Right to Development Recognition Targets, Legal Relevance, Case studies on the areas of conflict between right to development and rights of the poor.
- Food Law and Policy: New topics were introduced in Unit 3, 4 & 5. Consisting of the following:
- Globalization and its impact on Food Law and Policy and effect of green revolution on environment, health of people and other living beings.

MNREGA implementation vs Food Law and Policy.

Food Security and Land Acquisition-relevant provisions under Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013.

- International Environmental Law: New topic was introduced in Unit 6.
 Titled: International humanitarian law and environment.
- Law of Copyright: New topic was introduced in Unit1 & 6. Consisting of the following:

International instruments related to copyright protection

Scope of 'Academic use' of copyrighted work in fair dealing



FEEDBACK FROM STUDENTS


Report

Feedback forms were distributed in classrooms at the end of the semester to students from BALLB and BBALLB courses and LL.M programs in 2017-18. Student feedbacks are taken at the end of every semester to understand the needs of the students and to incorporate their suggestions through the curriculum development cell at School of Law. In addition, feedbacks are also taken from few students, anonymously to ensure fair and unbiased suggestions. In 2017-18, 900 student feedback forms were collected and analyzed. As per the analysis, most of the students were satisfied with the various aspects of the curriculum including incorporation of contemporary areas, subjects catering to jobs and future aspirations in the field of law. 

Report

Every year at the end of the semester, faculty members are given feedback forms to provide suggestions on the courses taught by them during the academic year. In 2017-18, 100 faculties submitted their feedback on the curriculum and the score was mostly ranging from good to satisfactory. Some of the faculty members suggested revision of their existing curriculum and also wanted to introduce new electives which was considered by the IQAC and CDC cells of School of Law. The suggestions were presented in the BOS and introduced in the following year. Faculties were asked to give their comments on the curriculum they taught and also wanted to know the amount of research contribution they could make during the course of the subject taught.
