

ACTION TAKEN REPORT 2016-17

In view of the feedback analysis, the gaps in the syllabus as per the requirement of various stakeholders, the department has taken the feedback on curriculum from the students, faculties, alumni, industry experts and parents. Suggestions to revise the syllabus with the inclusion of components of: Internationalization of curriculum; Service learning; and Interdisciplinary approaches were consolidated and discussed in IQAC and CDC, then communicated to the subject teachers. It was decided in the meetings that this feedback report be communicated to University.

The above changes were put forth in the Board of Studies meeting in January 2017, and 11.67% of curriculum revision was brought about in both BALLB and BBALLB courses which included components of service learning, interdisciplinary approach and international relevance.

As suggested by the IQAC, CDC and BOS following actions were prominently taken:

- 1. To help students to cater to a global market, curriculums were revised to include components of internationalization.
- 2. More contemporary legal topics were taken up for discussion during the current affair classes.
- 3. Lectures by industry experts on different fields of law to inculcate interests in subjects.
- 4. Students are given an orientation in the first year to help them understand the various opportunities in law school.
- 5. Slow learners and advanced learners are given more attention according to their needs.
- 6. Placement cell has been strengthened to provide guidance.
- 7. Extension programs on legal aid and environmental sensitization is given.
- 8. Skill oriented components have been included in the courses during revision.
- 9. To enhance their life skills departmental fests are held.
- 10. More faculty development programs have been held to facilitate faculties to meet student needs.


FEEDBACK FROM ALUMNI


EMPLOYER'S FEEDBACK




FEEDBACK FROM PARENTS
